MIGs DESTROY 2 PLANES FROM BRITISH CARRIER SHOT DOWN IN SEA OFF KOREA

From JOHN RIDLEY, Daily Telegraph Special Correspondent SEOUL, Korea, Monday.

Aircraft from the British carrier Ocean, 13,190 tons were attacked for the first time to-day by Communist jet MIGs. Of the three British planes hit, two crashed into the sea, but none of the pilots was lost.

A force of eight Sea Furies and Fireflies from Ocean were attacked by three MIGs when operating against storage dumps south-west of Chinnampo on the Korean west coast. The out-matched British planes took evasive action.

This is the farthest south that the Russian-built MIGs have ventured for some months. There has been heavy rain over most of Korea during the past two days and this has limited both air and land activity. Many roads are almost impassable and the front is a sea of mud. On the Eighth Army battlefield there was little to report. An enemy unit of undetermined strength which tried to probe an advanced United Nations position west and north-west of Yonchon early this morning was repulsed after a fire-fight lasting for almost an hour. BEY REFUSES TO RATIFY REFORMS

NEW TUNISIA CRISIS

From Our Own Correspondent PARIS, Monday. A new crisis developed to-day in Franco-Tunisian relations when Bey refused to ratify the reform Bill prepared by the French Government. M. de Hauteclocque, Resident-General, left the summer palace at Carthage with the sealed documents after over an hour of fruitless conversations.

The Bey adopted delaying tactics, expressing dissatisfaction with the reform Bill as a whole. He affirmed the attitude he adopted in a telegram last week to M. A. French President, asking for a time to study the reforms in the light of local conditions.
